Tuition and Fees:

Fees range based on number of credit hours you are taking – can be up to \$1300/semester and include use of the Student Health Center, Counseling Center, Campus Transportation, Student Legal Services, Student Ombuds, Campus Gym, etc.

As international students, you are listed as "Nonresidents of North Carolina"

Course Materials and Technology

Prepare to pay out of pocket for books, computers, etc.

- Undergraduates will be auto-enrolled in Course Ready (digital textbooks)
 - You will have to opt out individually.

You will likely need a computer for your work and studies.

University Libraries allows short-term rentals for free.

- Only 8 hours at a time
- Might not meet your processing needs

Paychecks

You will receive paychecks on a biweekly basis.

First paycheck will be smaller.

 You should arrive with some money to support yourself until you get paid.

Cost of living in Raleigh

Average rent - ranges from \$500-1500/month Many international students in the \$500-800/month range.

In most cases, rent does not include utilities (electricity, water, internet): Range from \$50-\$150/month

On-campus job opportunities (Research (RA) and Teaching Assistantships (TA)

Very unlikely students can work enough hours to cover costs for rent, utilities, food and other basic living expenses with a part-time job alone. (Limited opportunities during breaks/summer)

Consider the exchange rates in relation to US \$

If living off campus, you can expect to pay a security deposit for your apartment and another deposit for your utilities

Check with current students who can suggest housing options as well as sub-leasing options

Before signing a housing lease:

Leases are binding contracts:

Be sure to read before signing.

Contact Student Legal Services if you have any questions

Understand the term of the contract:

Most leases are for 12 months

May or may not allow for sub-leasers

Consider proximity to campus

Access to the free campus bus line - "Wolfline"

GoPass is the low-cost Raleigh transit pass.

Health Care/Medical Insurance:

All students are required to have health insurance (3 options)

- 1) Graduate Student Support Plan (GSSP)
 For those who are RA/TAs this is provided for free
- 2) Student Blue (University Health Insurance)
 For those not on the GSSP Health Plan, Approximately \$1400/semester
- 3) **Private insurance** (rare to receive necessary approval for waiver)
- **4) Campus Smiles** (NC State's dental clinic with affordable plans) https://www.campus-smiles.com/ncstate
- 5) UNC Dental Clinic (https://www.med.unc.edu/shac/programs/dental-clinic/)




